1. Welcome, Introductions and Apologies

The Chair welcomed members and guest, Ange Gillingham, SDC Leisure, Health and Wellbeing Projects Manager to the meeting. Introductions were given by those in attendance. Apologies are listed on the record above.

2. Minutes of the last meeting on 20 December 2021

Minutes were formally presented and agreed as a true and accurate record. Proposed by: Cate James-Hodges; Seconded by: Brandon Watkins.

3. Matters Arising

a) Recruitment & Selection of new Youth Participation Officer - update

Steve gave an update on the process to recruit to the vacant youth participation officer role. The application deadline had now passed. Shortlisting was about to commence with formal interviews set to take place week commencing 31 January, followed by workshop-based interviews involving youth voice representatives, scheduled for week commencing 7 February. The workshop-based interviews will require approximately 10 youth voice representatives from across the district, to participate in this part of the process – those involved will subsequently have a significant but balanced input into the final decision-making ahead of appointing the successful candidate. The process would obviously not take place if no candidates were deemed suitable at each selection stage.

b) Bus Service Improvement Plan – Survey from Gloucestershire County Council (GCC)

This was a reminder that GCC have launched a survey to gather views on their Bus Service Improvement Plan, as well as bus services in general. The deadline for participating is 30 January 2022. 4. Correspondence

Retirement of Members

The following member has retired from their role: **Lotty Trunks** – Stroud High School. Lotty was thanked for her services.

5. SDC Leisure and Wellbeing Strategy: SDYC Involvement and Next Steps – Ange Gillingham

Ange reflected on the input which various youth voice representatives had during the consultation stage of developing the leisure and wellbeing strategy; highlighting the huge positive contribution and impact made by those young people involved. She was pleased to state, that many of the suggestions made during March 2021, now feature in the 20-year strategy. Examples are a variety of activities for those that do not like traditional sports; higher quality facilities to encourage more to participate; improvement to cycling and walking routes to increase access and increase usage. Some pilot activities have emerged including those from the Pulse in Dursley delivered during the summer 2021. Strategic links are made with the Canal project and emerging housing development as well plans from the health and wellbeing related Integrated Locality Partnerships. The strategy also acknowledges that the district is currently 4 sports pitches short. Active travel is a prominent feature and relates to the location of seasonal type activities. A new leisure facility will possibly emerge along the A38 corridor, particularly to meet the growing population and the need for more swimming pools.

The next steps for further involvement of SDYC, includes helping with youth consultations in different locations and groups; plus helping to scope what a future leisure offer would look like for teenagers and how much it should cost. Subsequent questions were asked regarding how these key facilities will be managed, with a local authority owned trading company being considered as one option.

It was agreed that a small group of members could meet in the future with Ange, to further this work.

6. Updates from School & College Councils and Local Youth Forum Groups

<u>Archway School</u> – Cate reported that she had met with the school head teacher regarding plans to promote our local youth forum groups to students.

Berkeley Vale YF – no representatives were present.

<u>Chalford Cubed YF</u> – no representatives were present.

<u>Cam & Dursley YF</u> – the group furthered their discussion on pedestrian safety in Dursley, this stemmed from the experience of needing to use the very narrow pavements whilst window judging, with the speed of traffic being an issue.

<u>Cainscross YF</u> – no representatives were present.

Hardwicke YF – no representatives were present.

<u>Katharine Lady Berkeley School</u> – no representatives were present.

Maidenhill School – no representatives were present.

Marling School - no report available.

Nailsworth & Minchinhampton YF – no representatives were present.

<u>Rednock School</u> – emails have been sent to various tutors in search for a response to the previous efforts to communicate with them on the opportunities to have increased student representation on SDYC.

<u>Stonehouse Action 4 Youth</u> – the group have begun reconsidering the opportunity to get involved again with matters to do with the old Ship Inn development site.

<u>Stroud High School</u> – a recent school council meeting held discussions on recycling and setting up a planter made of eco bricks. In addition, thoughts were also given to a fundraiser for an eating disorder charity; it's likely that an awareness event will emerge on this topic.

<u>Stroud Town & 5 Valleys YF</u> – the town council had confirmed, the wood required to make the project bench had now been purchased.

Thomas Keble School – no report available.

<u>Wotton YF</u> – no representatives present.

Review Approved Report from Last Meeting on 23.08.21: Members were asked to note, that the Leadership Team felt good progress had been made, so far this year - particularly with regards to SDYC influencing SDC policy and decision-making

<u>Updates on Project Teams and Focus Groups</u>: Members were asked to note, that a general conversation was had on bringing those present, up to date on the status of various SDYC projects and programmes.

<u>BYC Regional Convention & UK Youth Parliament Elections & Make Your Mark:</u> Members had it recommended, that SDYC has representation at the forthcoming regional e-convention (online).

Members were asked to note, that the UKYP election nominations and Make Your Mark ballots would be both open soon.

<u>Votes at 16 Coalition:</u> Members were asked to note, that SDYC would be represented at the Votes at 16 Coalition Meeting on 17 January 2022.

<u>Communicating with the Stroud and Cotswold Members of Parliament:</u> Members were asked to note, that communication will be made with our Members of Parliament from both Stroud and Cotswold

constituencies, regarding meeting to discuss the various parts of the SDYC Manifesto.

10. Local Democracy Focus Group Report from meeting on 17 January

<u>BYC</u> and <u>Coalition Votes at 16 Meeting – 17 January</u>: Members were asked to note, that SDYC were represented at the recent Votes at 16 Coalition meeting and received the offer of direct support from them on a local campaign to influence the two MPs for Stroud and Cotswold respectively.

<u>Statutory Youth Voice – develop a draft structure:</u> Members were asked to note, that work on creating a draft structure for a county-wide youth voice vehicle has begun, with much more to do soon.

11. Recruitment to SDYC – Schools and Local Youth Forum Groups

Some members explained their efforts to promote the opportunities to fellow students, to join direct from their school to SDYC and of joining respective local youth forum groups, had been difficult. However, ideas were shared and led to some ideas as to how SGS College could also be encouraged to have representation to SDYC – Tom and Charlie agreed to work on this. Overall, members were encouraged to offer these opportunities to friends and even younger family members.

A brief discussion was had on the potential of holding some training events during the half term break, week commencing 21 February. This included: C-Card training from the Eddystone Trust: mental health first aid training; and perhaps some fun outdoor activities locally.
